**APPLICATION OF SCHILTZ & SCHILTZ AS SPECIAL COUNSEL
TO THE TRUSTEE FOR ALLOWANCE OF INTERIM COMPENSATION FOR
SERVICES RENDERED AND REIMBURSEMENT OF ACTUAL AND NECESSARY
EXPENSES INCURRED FROM DECEMBER 1, 2016 THROUGH MARCH 31, 2017
AND FOR RELEASE OF A PORTION OF FEES HELD BACK**

Franz Schiltz, together with the other members and associates at the law firm of Schiltz & Schiltz, which has offices in Luxembourg (collectively, “Schiltz”), special counsel for Irving H. Picard (the “Trustee”), the trustee for the liquidation of the business of Bernard L. Madoff Investment Securities LLC (“BLMIS” or “Debtor”) under the Securities Investor Protection Act of 1970, 15 U.S.C. §§ 78aaa *et seq.* (“SIPA”), and Bernard L. Madoff, submits this Application for Interim Allowance of Fees and Reimbursement of Expenses (the “Application”) for compensation of legal fees in the amount of \$63,987.24 (of which 20% is to be deferred through the conclusion of the liquidation period), reimbursement of expenses in the amount of \$4,159.17 for the period from December 1, 2016 through March 31, 2017 (the “Compensation Period”),

and the release of \$86,893.84 (which represents a portion of fees held back). In support of the Application, Schiltz respectfully submits as follows:

I. BACKGROUND

1. On December 15, 2008, Judge Stanton of the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, upon application filed on the same date by the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (“SIPC”), ordered the liquidation of BLMIS in accordance with SIPA and appointed the Trustee as BLMIS’s trustee.

2. Pursuant to SIPA § 78eee(b)(4), BLMIS’s liquidation proceeding was removed to this Court, and, pursuant to SIPA § 78fff(b), BLMIS’s liquidation proceeding is being conducted as though it were a case under chapters 1, 3, and 5 and subchapters I and II of chapter 7 of title 11 of the United States Code (the “Bankruptcy Code”).

3. On April 14, 2009, this Court entered an order approving the Trustee’s motion to retain Schiltz *nunc pro tunc* as of March 3, 2009 as special counsel to the Trustee in all matters pertaining to Luxembourg law and Luxembourg legal proceedings.

4. The Trustee’s motion to retain Schiltz established a fee arrangement pursuant to which Schiltz agreed to a fee reduction in the amount of 10%. Schiltz also agreed to an additional holdback of fees in the amount of 20% (“Holdback”).

II. SERVICES RENDERED BY SCHILTZ

5. The legal services performed by Schiltz on behalf of the Trustee during the time period covered by this Application are as follows:

6. On behalf of the Trustee, Schiltz continued to monitor BLMIS-related cases pending before the Luxembourg courts and advise the Trustee regarding the same.

7. Schiltz also represented the Trustee before Luxembourg courts in BLMIS-related proceedings.

8. Schiltz continued to provide the Trustee with research and analysis of Luxembourg law.

III. COMPENSATION REQUESTED

9. The Application demonstrates how Schiltz has both added value to BLMIS's estate and advanced BLMIS's liquidation proceeding.

10. Schiltz has been mindful of the need to avoid undue legal fees in this case and has taken all reasonable steps to provide cost-effective representation while rendering services with the highest degree of skill and professionalism. To that end, Schiltz has staffed this matter leanly and endeavored to eliminate duplication of efforts by giving primary responsibility of the case to one partner, Franz Schiltz, and involving other attorneys only when necessary.

11. From December 1, 2016 through March 31, 2017, Schiltz provided a total of 117.6 hours of legal services to the Trustee in this case. Prior to the 10% discount, the total amount of fees incurred in this time period was \$71,096.93 and the total blended rate for professional services was \$604.57/hour. After the 10% discount, the total amount of fees incurred is \$63,987.24 and the total blended rate is \$544.11/hour. Schiltz has agreed to a further 20% holdback of fees in the amount of \$12,797.45, resulting in the present request for compensation in the amount of \$51,189.79.

12. A breakdown of the total number of hours performed by each Schiltz timekeeper is provided on **Exhibit A** annexed hereto.

13. Schiltz seeks reimbursement for out-of-pocket expenses incurred in connection with its representation of the Trustee during the Compensation Period in the amount of \$4,159.17. An itemized list of these expenses is detailed on **Exhibit B** annexed hereto.

14. Schiltz typically charges its clients an additional amount equivalent to 8% of his fees in order to cover normal office expenses. In this case, Schiltz agreed to charge normal office expenses at a reduced rate of 6.5%.

IV. RELEASE OF THE HOLDBACK

15. The Trustee' motion to retain Schiltz established a Holdback fee arrangement in which 20% of the approved compensation is deferred until further order of the Court.

16. For the prior and current compensation periods, the amount of the Holdback for Schiltz's fees is \$173,787.69. Schiltz seeks a release of the Holdback in the amount of \$86,893.84 upon the support of SIPC.

17. SIPC has advised Schiltz that it will file a recommendation in support of the fees and expenses in this Application and the release of the Holdback in the amount of \$86,893.84 for Schiltz.

18. Hence, Schiltz respectfully requests that this Court authorize the release of the Holdback payment to Schiltz in the amount of \$86,893.84, as supported by SIPC.

V. GENERAL MATTERS

19. All of the professional services for which compensation is requested herein were performed by Schiltz for and on behalf of the Trustee and not on behalf of any other person or entity.

20. No agreement or understanding exists between Schiltz and any other person for sharing compensation received in connection with this case, nor has any other person or entity agreed to provide Schiltz with compensation for the legal services described herein.

21. SIPA § 78eee(b)(5)(A) provides in pertinent part that, upon appropriate application and after a hearing, “[t]he court shall grant reasonable compensation for services rendered and reimbursement for proper costs and expenses incurred . . . by a trustee, and by the attorney for such a trustee.” SIPA § 78eee(b)(5)(C) specifically establishes SIPC’s role in connection with applications for compensation and the consideration the Court should give to SIPC’s recommendation concerning fees, providing as follows:

In any case in which such allowances are to be paid by SIPC without reasonable expectation of recoupment thereof as provided in this chapter and there is no difference between the amounts requested and the amounts recommended by SIPC, the court shall award the amounts recommended by SIPC. In determining the amount of allowances in all other cases, the court shall give due consideration to the nature, extent, and value of the services rendered, and shall place considerable reliance on the recommendation of SIPC.

22. To the extent the general estate is insufficient to pay such allowances as an expense of administration, SIPA §§ 78eee(b)(5)(E) and 78fff-3(b)(2) require SIPC to advance the funds necessary to pay the compensation of Schiltz.

23. At this time, the Trustee has determined that he has no reasonable expectation that the general estate will be sufficient to make a distribution to general creditors or pay administrative expenses. SIPC has advised the Trustee that it concurs with this determination. Accordingly, any fees and expenses allowed by this Court will be paid from advances by SIPC without any reasonable expectation by SIPC of recoupment thereof.

24. Therefore, with respect to this Application, Schiltz requests that, consistent with SIPA § 78eee(b)(5)(C), the Court “shall award the amounts recommended by SIPC.” *See In re*

Bell & Beckwith, 112 B.R. 876 (Bankr. N.D. Ohio 1990). Schiltz expects that SIPC's recommendation in support of the relief sought by this Application will be filed with this Court separately.

WHEREFORE, Schiltz respectfully requests that this Court enter an Order:

- a. Granting this Application; and
- b. Allowing and awarding \$63,987.24, of which \$51,189.79 is to be paid currently and \$12,797.45 is to be held back through the conclusion of the liquidation period or until further order of the Court, as an interim payment for professional services rendered by Schiltz to the Trustee from December 1, 2016 through March 31, 2017; and
- c. Allowing payment to Schiltz in the amount of \$4,159.17 for reimbursement of expenses incurred by Schiltz from December 1, 2016 through March 31, 2017; and
- d. Releasing \$86,893.84 to Schiltz from the Holdback for prior and current compensation periods; and
- e. Granting Schiltz such other and further relief as this Court deems just and proper.
